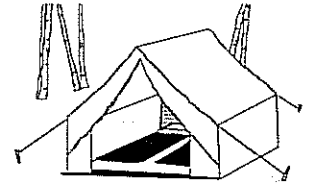


## General Information

1. Date: April 23, 24, & 25 2010
2. Location: Dyer County Fairgrounds
3. Check in: Friday: 4:00-8:00 p.m. // Saturday: 8:00-8:30 a.m.
4. Cost: \$10.00 for all registered Boy Scouts and registered adult leaders (this includes a patch). Registration (roster and fee) will be turned in upon arrival to the District Outdoor Committee Chairman at headquarters, but no later than Friday evening crackerbarrel. Boys and leaders arriving late can be added.
5. Camping gear and personal equipment are the responsibility of each camper. Clothes suitable for Spring weather should be worn. Personal gear should include a ground cloth, air mattress, sleeping bag (blankets, sheets, pillow), flashlight (extra batteries), cooking gear, drinking cup, canteen, change of clothes, rain coat or poncho, gloves and extra socks.
6. Food and menus are left up to the discretion of each Troop
7. The District Outdoor Committee will have final say regarding postponement of Camporee due to inclement weather. If bad weather occurs during the Camporee and a Troop decides to leave, then a leader from the Troop must checkout with the District Executive or Camporee Chair.
8. Fire pits are allowed, but only one per Troop. All sod must be put back on top. but each Troop is asked to bring their own firewood. No trees are to be cut.
9. There should be no electronic equipment; this includes Gameboys, radios, cd players, and TVs. The focus is on nature and Scouting.
10. Each Troop will receive a participation ribbon, and ribbons will be given out for competitions.
11. The Camporee Schedule will be reviewed Friday night at the Cracker Barrel at the headquarters tent.
12. **Trophies will be awarded for Dutch Oven Desserts for 1st, 2nd place, youth & adults**

## Important Rules

1. One campfire per Troop. Use down wood or bring your own. **DO NOT CUT TREES.**
2. (If fire pits are dug, they must be cleaned and filled in level with ground at departure. All firewood must be left away from field.) Re – Sod back / Leave No Trace
3. Participants should camp together as a Troop.
4. Each Troop must control and carry out its own trash and garbage.
5. All saws, axes, and knives must be kept by adults. Do not let boys handle these tools. Leaders, who allow it, do so at their own risk.
6. Cooking is to be done with adults in attendance at all times. Charcoal or portable camp stoves may be used IF controlled by adults.
7. Each Troop should have FIRST AID supplies available inside the campsites at all times.
8. No lanterns, stoves or candles permitted inside the tents at any time. Let's have no tragedies.
9. NO chain saws permitted. NO alcohol, firearms, bow and arrows, or sheath knives permitted! Or B.B. Guns!
10. Those Troops who plan on camping on Saturday night should plan on attending the church service on Sunday morning. No one should be at their campsite or leaving the camping area while the church service is taking place. Each person should be at the church service. A Scout is reverent.
11. No pets. (Except seeing-eye dogs.)
12. Please park automobiles in designated parking area. Limited parking, try to car pool.
13. Some water will be available. But be prepared and bring some extra water.
14. **Camporee will be confined to designated area. All other areas of Fairgrounds will be off limits.**

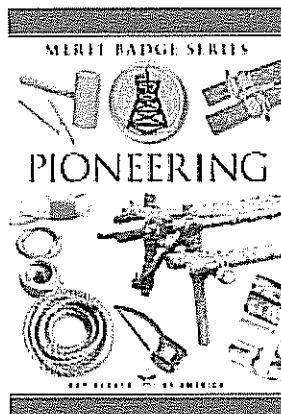

## Pioneering

Requirements were **REVISED** effective January 1, 2006.

1. Show that you know first aid for injuries or illness that could occur while working on pioneering projects, including minor cuts and abrasions, bruises, rope burns, blisters, splinters, sprains, heat and cold reactions, dehydration, and insect bites or stings.
2. Do the following:
  - a. Successfully complete Tenderfoot requirements [4a and 4b](#) and First Class requirements [7a, 7b, and 7c](#). (These are the rope-related requirements.)
  - b. Tie the following: square knot, bowline, sheepshank, sheet bend, and roundturn with two half hitches.
  - c. Demonstrate the following: tripod and round lashings.
3. Explain why it is useful to be able to throw a rope, then demonstrate how to coil and throw a 40-foot length of 1/4- or 3/8-inch rope. Explain how to improve your throwing distance by adding weight to the end of your rope.
4. Explain the differences between synthetic ropes and natural-fiber ropes. Discuss which types of rope are suitable for pioneering work and why. Include the following in your discussion: breaking strength, safe working loads, and the care and storage of rope.
5. Explain the uses for the back splice, eye splice, and short splice. Using 1/4- or 3/8-inch three-stranded rope, demonstrate how to form each splice.
6. Using a rope-making device or machine, make a rope at least 6 feet long consisting of three strands, each having three yarns.
7. Build a scale model of a signal tower or a monkey bridge. Correctly anchor the model using either the 1-1-1 anchoring system or the log and stake anchoring method. Describe the design of your project and explain how the anchoring system works.
8. Demonstrate the use of rope tackle to lift a weight of 25 pounds and pulling a log at least 6 inches in diameter and 6 feet long with the tackle. Use the tackle to put tension on a line. Explain the advantages and limitations of using a rope tackle. In your explanation, describe the potential damage that friction can do to a rope.

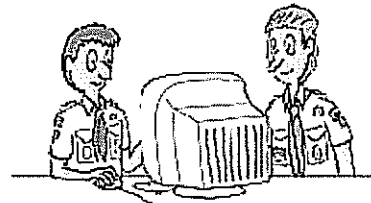
9. By yourself, build an A-trestle OR X-trestle OR H-trestle using square and diagonal lashings. Explain the application of the trestle you build. Demonstrate how to tie two spars together using a shear lashing.
10. With a group of Scouts, OR on your own, select a pioneering project. With your counselor's guidance, create a rough sketch of the project. Make a list of the ropes and spars needed, then build the project. (Note: This requirement may be done at summer camp, at district or council events, or on a troop camp outing.)
